Supervisor Elizabeth C. Archuleta arrived at 6:29 p.m.

**Absent/Excused:** Vice Chair Jim Parks.

**Also Present:** County Manager James Jayne, Deputy County Manager Marie Peoples, Deputy County Manager/Public Works Director Lucinda Andreani, Public Affairs Director Eric Peterson, Deputy County Attorney Rose Winkeler, Special Initiatives Director Kim Musselman, Clerk of the Board of Supervisors Lindsay Daley and Deputy Clerk of the Board Valerie Webber.

Chairwoman Fowler called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m. and led the pledge of allegiance.

**Call to the Public:**

There were no comments from the public for items not on the agenda.

**Recognition:**

1. Recognize Rose Toehe for being named the 2019 Female Citizen of the Year by the Arizona Daily Sun. **Board of Supervisors**

Deputy County Manager/Public Works Director Lucinda Andreani spoke about various accomplishments and impacts Ms. Rose Toehe has had on the community; adding that she is the first Native American woman to be selected for the recognition.

Ms. Toehe said she was really encouraged that her leaders have done this recognition. She spoke about her clan and wanted to pay honors to her family by blood and thank them for being present and supporting her through the years. She noted she wouldn't have done this alone but for the people in the room including, her family, her clan, her indigenous family and County family. She thanked her co-workers and Deputy County Manager Lucinda Andreani.

She further spoke about different community members who help bridge the gap between people of color. Anything that impacts her indigenous community she is willing to support.

Health and Human Services Director Thomas Pristow said he is honored to be here to recognize Ms. Toehe and the excellent work she does in the community but most importantly, her kindness and ability to connect with anybody.

County Workforce Development Specialist Cindy Wilson said she could not express how much she appreciates this honor for Ms. Toehe. She spoke about the important work she does in the community and how she leads by example.

Dorothy (*unknown last name and spelling*) stated she previously worked with Ms. Toehe. When she was selected as citizen of the year, a lot of people commented on the work she has done in the community. She truly serves as a community leader and liaison for Native American people.

Sharon Doctor, Inter-Tribal Advisory Council Chair, spoke about her experience working with Ms. Toehe and said she truly brings light to all the work she does and to the community.

Coconino County Inter-Tribal Advisory Council liaison, Susie Garretson, explained how a citizen of the year is chosen, they get nominated and chosen by past citizens of the year.

Supervisor Archuleta arrived in person at 6:29 p.m.

Career Center Program Manager, George Ovalle, spoke about how long he has known Ms. Toehe and said she makes the team better.

Ruth Eaton, Coconino County Hispanic Advisory Council Chair, said the three diversity councils are so proud of Ms. Toehe for representing as a woman. She spoke about her kindness and professionalism and the example she sets for the County.

Human Resources Director Erika Philpot spoke about Ms. Toehe's support for all ideas. She spoke about an occasion wherein she introduced her son to Ms. Toehe and he later spoke about how kind she was.

Elaine Kasch said she's known Rose and Steve for many years and was there on behalf of all of the children. Ms. Toehe represents them as a role model with the kindness and leadership she portrays.

Nelson Toehe noted Ms. Toehe was his baby sister. He spoke about her childhood and how he raised her. He thanked the Board and everyone present for recognizing her accomplishments.

Steve Toehe, spouse of Ms. Toehe, noted this was an amazing gathering and he was glad to see the diversity in the room. He spoke about the ultimate price his father paid for this great nation. He and Rose always taught their children to be supportive. There is so much she does for people at home and in the community. Rose was a daughter who refused to allow her mother to be put in a nursing home and learned first aid, CPR, and all things needed to help her mother. He spoke about all the amazing people in the community and thanked all that were present to support his wife. He spoke about the need for everyone to not have a bit of discrimination in them. He told a story about his adopted dad, who was a United States Marine that had three purple hearts, who said all marines donate three pints of blood before they go to war so that if they get injured there was blood available to any other person that needs it. He told his son to never discriminate as blood from all different persons can run in your blood. He thanked all those that served and serve in the military and thanked the Board for the recognition.

Prairie (*unknown last name or spelling*) noted Ms. Toehe is her aunt. She thanked her for everything she has done to help her become the woman that she is.

Individual Board members shared various experiences they have had working with Ms. Toehe and expressed their appreciation for her work in the community.

County Manager Jayne stated Ms. Toehe is someone that always adds positive energy wherever she goes. She is truly a wonderful person and the County is very proud to have her as part of the team. He thanked her for her service to the community.

The Board, Rose Toehe, her family members and various diversity council board members posed for a photo opportunities.

Chairwoman Fowler reconvened open session at 7:22 p.m.

Clerk of the Board Lindsay Daley introduced the application for a Series 7 (Beer and Wine Bar) liquor license to Ruchit Patel with the Grand Canyon Inn. Explaining that the Clerk's Office has not received any comments after the property was posted for 20 days. Community Development, Sheriff, Health Department and Risk Manager have no concerns.

Chairwoman Fowler opened the public hearing for comment at 7:26 p.m.; there being none, she closed the public hearing.

Clerk of the Board Lindsay Daley introduced the application for a Series 12 (Restaurant) liquor license to Ruchit Patel with the Grand Canyon Inn. Explaining that the Clerk's Office has not received any comments after the property was posted for 20 days. Community Development, Sheriff, Health Department and Risk Manager have no concerns.

Chairwoman Fowler opened the public hearing for comment at 7:28 p.m.; there being none, she closed the public hearing.

**Discussion Items:**

12. Presentation and discussion regarding an update of the Flood Control District's current projects and District's financial status. **Flood Control**

**Presenter:** Deputy County Manager/Public Works Director Lucinda Andreani, Forest Restoration Director Jay Smith, County Engineer Chris Tressler and Public Works Division Manager Jeremy Floyd.

**PowerPoint:** Flood Control District Board of Director meeting January 14, 2020.

Deputy County Manager/Flood Control District Administrator Lucinda Andreani stated the presentation will provide updates prior to moving forward with budget season. She noted Town of Tusayan Mayor Craig Sanderson, Town of Fredonia Vice Mayor Don Johnson, Town of Fredonia Interim Town Manager Shannon Lathim, City of Flagstaff Stormwater Project Manager Ed Schenk and Neil Chapman were all present.

Forest Restoration Director Jay Smith provided a brief update on the forest restoration project at Bill Williams Mountain. The County has spent \$800,000 on Phase 1 Steep Slope, Kaibab National Forest has spent \$1,800,000 and the National Forest Foundation has spent \$365,000 from state and private funds. Phase 1 Steep Slope project includes 300 acres to clear with 33% complete. In Fiscal Year 2021, staff is looking at Phase 2 and may need more funding based on project needs.

There were various post-wildfire risk studies completed and staff is waiting on data from the contractor in order to run models that have concern for flooding. These studies included Mormon Mountain, Munds Park and Sedona/Oak Creek. In review of developing a Forest Restoration Master Plan, staff will be concentrating on key elements, scientific analysis and additional, potential funding sources.

Mr. Smith displayed photos of the air curtain burner being used at the Chimney Springs Pilot Project and spoke about staff's review of cost analysis, production rate, training of employees and United States Forest Service comfortableness with the burner.

Upon inquiry from Director Babbott, Forest Restoration Director Smith agreed there will be a need to address the use of the air curtain burner both regionally and nationally before staff can use it on federal lands.

He highlighted potential grant opportunities for additional funding of forest restoration projects and answered questions asked by individual Board members.

Deputy County Manager/Flood Control District Administrator Lucinda Andreani explained that Emergency Management's Sam Beckett is working with the Williams community on expectations and emergency management responses if there ever were a fire on Bill Williams Mountain.

Flood Control District Board Attorney Joshua Carden appeared telephonically at 7:49 p.m.

County Engineer Chris Tressler introduced County Engineer in training, Charlie Wilson. He continued with a presentation that provided updates on the Mountain Dell Sinclair Wash construction project and the Tusayan Floodplain Mapping project. Upon inquiry from Director Babbott, Mr. Tressler explained the next steps in completion of the flood study in Tusayan and the need to permit the development through the County and Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Town of Tusayan Mayor Craig Sanderson expressed his appreciation of the County's cooperation in the project. He spoke about community risk associated with flooding and the purpose of the analysis.

Director Babbott thanked Mayor Sanderson for coming to the meeting and for his participation in various difficult, underlying challenges.

Engineer Tressler continued with a presentation that highlighted mitigation continuing to be done following the Museum Fire. He presented a conceptual map (*a copy of which was provided to the Clerk*) that reflected Mount Elden Estates and areas being proposed for stabilization; areas that may also qualify for a grant to complete the funding gap.

Deputy County Manager/Flood Control District Administrator Lucinda Andreani and Engineer Tressler answered questions asked by individual Board members related to progression of current mitigation efforts.

Director Archuleta spoke about the importance of community outreach to reinforce that the work being done upstream will greatly affect what happens downstream in the community.

Engineer Tressler spoke about a second grant funding opportunity through the Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs called the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. This grant allows the County to provide some alluvial fan stabilization and increase the capacity of existing channels in residential areas. He answered questions related to anticipated work being done, the need for corresponding easements and the need for impact parameter analysis results.

Upon inquiry from Director Babbott, Engineer Tressler explained community outreach being done to explain how staff will be mitigating the basins and channels.

City of Flagstaff Stormwater Project Manager Ed Schenk noted they are wrapping up a baseline study of flow on the Linda Vista culvert. They have applied for a hazard mitigation project and a pre disaster mitigation grant through Arizona Department of Emergency and Military Affairs (AZDEMA) for a low water armored crossing near the BNSF railroad. Upon inquiry from Director Archuleta, Mr. Schenk stated there have not been any improvements on Rose Street. He further explained that the City supports the work of the Flood Control District.

Public Works Administrative Services Division Manager Jeremy Floyd reviewed the Fiscal Year 2019 end of the year fund balance, revenues and expenses and budgeted amounts for various capital expenses. Upon inquiry from Director Ryan, Flood Control Administrator Andreani explained that once we get final numbers from DEMA for reimbursements, staff will bring the information back to the Board to review fund balances.

Flood Control Administrator Andreani highlighted key considerations that resulted from a meeting held on October 1<sup>st</sup> with representatives from various cities and towns. She spoke about an additional meeting currently being scheduled to discuss pre-budget process in addressing Flood Control District priorities for Fiscal Year 2021, FEMA reimbursements, project costs and the Forest Restoration Master Plan.

Individual Board members commented on the importance of holding meetings with cities and towns to communicate the Flood Control District's projects and funding.

**Motion:** Resolve as the Board of Supervisors, **Action:** approve, **Moved by:** Director Elizabeth Archuleta, **Seconded by:** Director Art Babbott. The motion passed unanimously.
