Why practice construction/demolition (C&D) waste management?

C&D project waste is one of the largest contributors to our landfills. Depending on where you live and the services provided, anywhere between 25-40% of landfills are filled with these materials, a lot of which can be recycled or salvaged. You can reuse or recycle most C&D waste including concrete, porcelain, rigid plastics, tile, lumber, metals, masonry, plastic, rock, carpet, and insulation. The practice of diverting and minimizing unwanted C&D waste makes our County more environmentally and economically sustainable through the following:

- **Minimize embodied energy:** by recycling or reusing materials, you are using less energy through the processes of transporting, disposing, and manufacturing new materials and waste requires fossil fuels or other forms of energy;
- **Reduce methane emissions:** improper decomposition of materials (lumber, etc.) release more greenhouse gases than would naturally occur, which play a role in the effects of climate change;
- **Less money spent from homeowners or contractors:** reusing materials when able saves money;
- **Smaller amount of landfill space used**

Construction Waste Management Plans:

A successful construction waste management plan should be incorporated in all stages of the design, build, and demolition processes. A construction waste management plan should:

- List materials in project that can be recycled or reused
- Specify location and fee information to recycle and dispose materials
- Adopt protocol for sorting and transporting materials that are recyclable
- Incorporate provisions that address infringements of the construction waste management plan, including ways to ameliorate noncompliance
- Designate a waste management coordinator

<p>VEGETATIVE/SITE CLEARING DEBRIS</p>	<p>Cinder Lake Landfill 6770 E. Landfill Road Flagstaff, AZ 86004 Ph: (928) 213-2125</p>	<p>All City of Flagstaff residents that have 90 gallon residential trash and recycling service are eligible to have yard waste collected as well. The collection runs through spring and summer months, and chipper trucks follow the same schedule as Bulk Trash Collection. Waste should be piled neatly parallel to the street. Larger branches and roots can be dropped off at Cinder Lake Landfill to be mulched on site.</p> <p>If you are removing organic plant matter which is not considering legally invasive, residential or commercial options may be available.</p>

Landfill Road Flagstaff, AZ 86004 Ph: (928) 213-2125</p>	<p>Cinder Lake Landfill grinds wood waste into chips. For the purposes of safe grinding of material, wood waste loads shall be free of chunks of debris such as metal, plastic, drywall, and concrete.</p> <p>Wood waste that is accepted by Cinder Lake Landfill for chipping: Treated and untreated lumber, small diameter trees (including root system), laminated wood, plywood, particle board, wafer board, and oriented strand board.</p>
<p>PACKAGING</p> <p>(GLASS, CARDBOARD, PAPER, PLASTICS: <i>not plastic bags or scraps</i>)</p>	<p>Cinder Lake Landfill 6770 E. Landfill Road Flagstaff, AZ 86004 Ph: (928) 213-2125</p>	<p>Glass must not be included with the general recycling. Glass can be dropped off at designated receptacles throughout the City of Flagstaff, including the Materials Recovery Facility at 1800 East Butler. Coconino County residents can drop off glass at the Cinder Lake Landfill.</p> <p>The following materials are accepted: cardboard; paper; steel, tin, and aluminum cans; paperboard; plastics #1-7. 90-gallon containers are available for curbside pickup while larger two, four, and six cubic yard containers are available as well.</p>

Fourth St. Flagstaff, AZ 86004 Ph: (928)779-1314</p>	<p>Appliances (stoves, washers, dryers, refrigerators, and water heaters) and metals are accepted at Cinder Lakes Landfill. These materials are then hauled off by a recycler. Appliance Collection Service is free to City of Flagstaff customers with 90 gallon service, but there is a fee charged to businesses. The units that are collected will be recycled. Collections must be scheduled in advance by calling.</p>

The hazardous materials on this page include some construction/building waste such as asbestos, electrical equipment, gardening products, paints and painting products, and light bulbs.</p> <p>The HPC also has a drop and swap program where you can pick up other useable hazardous products (paints, sealants, etc.) for free.</p>

The site has open-top waste bins, a white goods and scrap steel bin, a residential recyclables bin, and ash barrels.</p> <p>Willard Springs Transfer Station is open Friday and Saturday 9:00 am - 3:00 pm in the winter and Friday - Monday 9:00 am - 5:00 pm in the summer. The site has a waste compactor, two open-top waste bins, a recycle bin, a white goods and scrap steel bin, and ash barrels. This site also offers a fenced 1/2 acre forest material collection and burn area.</p>
